Dear Warm Heart friends and family:

A D-Day Story:

This month marks the 81st anniversary of the largest amphibious landing in history as the Allies landed in Normandy to liberate Europe from the Nazis. Over 156,000 troops would land or parachute into France in this invasion.

In the wee hours of the dark morning before soldiers landed on the beaches, paratroopers landed across the countryside. The 82nd Airborne landed in the area of the French village Sainte-Mère-Église. One unfortunate group jumped over the wrong area into the clutches of a German garrison that was already awake, working to stop a house fire set by the initial naval barrage. One lucky trooper, 31 year old Private John Steele, missed the burning house but hit the local church in Sainte-Mère-Église. His chute got caught up in the steeple and he was left dangling on the side of the church for several hours, unable to free himself. In the morning light, he was discovered and captured - one of the few non-casualties of the two planes of troopers that fell on the village. This story is showed in detail in "The Longest Day".

John Steele eventually escaped and found his way back to the American lines where he rejoined the fight. He served in the remainder of the war with distinction, collecting honors and medals. He later passed away in North Carolina in the 1960s.

To this day, the village of Sainte-Mère-Église commemorates the allies' liberation of the town with a mannequin that resembles Private Steele on the side of their church, and stained glass windows that tell the story.

Our eternal thanks go to the heroes of D-Day so long ago.

As I read the story, I was reminded of the words of Rock of Ages; and a few lines came to mind:

Rock of ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in thee Nothing in my hands I bring, Simply to Thy cross I cling; Naked, come to Thee for dress, Helpless, look to Thee for grace: Foul, I to the fountain fly, Wash me, Savior, or I die.

The fortunate mistake of landing on the steeple kept John safe that night. May we also find our safety and peace in the people and place called Church of the Warm Heart. See you in church on Sunday,

June is skin Cancer Awareness Month. Let's stay safe and stay protected!

What is skin cancer? Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the U.S., but it's also one of the most preventable. Skin cancer is the cancer you can SEE. Some people are more prone to getting a sunburn, but anyone can get skin cancer. It occurs when abnormal skin cells grow uncontrollably, often due to excessive exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun or tanning beds.

Types of Skin Cancer:

- Basal Cell Carcinoma (BCC) The most common, often appearing as a pearly bump or red patch.
- Squamous Cell Carcinoma (SCC) Can look like a scaly sore or rough bump.
- Melanoma The deadliest type, often appearing as an irregularly shaped mole.

How to Protect Yourself:

 \checkmark Wear Sunscreen – Use SPF 30+ every day, even on cloudy days.

 $\checkmark\,$ Cover Up – Wear hats, sunglasses, and protective clothing.

 \checkmark Avoid Tanning Beds – Artificial UV rays are dangerous.

 \checkmark Check Your Skin Regularly – Look for new or changing moles and spots.

Know the ABCDEs of Melanoma:

- \mathbf{Q} A Asymmetry: One half does not match the other.
- **Q** B Border: Irregular or blurred edges.
- **Q** C Color: Multiple colors or uneven shades.
- **Q** D Diameter: Larger than a pencil eraser.
- **Q** E Evolving: Changes in size, shape, or color.

Skin Cancer Facts:

 \bigstar Over 5 million cases of skin cancer are diagnosed in the U.S. each year.

★ 1 in 5 Americans will develop skin cancer by age 70.

★ Early detection saves lives – when caught early, melanoma has a 99% survival rate!

- ✓ Educate your loved ones about sun safety.

For the fourth straight month, our gifts have failed to meet the needs for general operations. We are now more than \$30,000 in a deficit position. Fortunately, we are still in a sound financial position due to the \$68,543 surplus that we carried over from 2024. As we look back three years to compare, we can see that we were in a similar position in the past. The past three years all had a deficit after four months: \$54,000 in 2023, \$25,000 in 2024, and the current deficit of \$31,000 this year. However, there is good news in May: after three weeks (with one more Sunday to receive an offering) we are doing very well and, hopefully, we will not have a May deficit.

We are approaching the summer months, when attendance and offerings are traditionally lower. Please remember that our church expenses don't take a vacation! There are many ways to continue to give if you are out of town or out of the country. If you don't want to see your Stewardship Chairman under stress, please keep up your giving and remind your friends to do the same.

These are exciting times in our church. The youth are setting the final details for their mission trip, and they depart on June 13. Vacation Bible is happening—probably as you read this! Graduations have wrapped up, and it is always fun to see the excitement of the grads as they begin a new chapter in their lives. Some of our men are planning to paint the exterior of the FLC and spruce up our facilities during the summer. And at Coffee Hour, you can hear lots of talk about planned and upcoming vacations. Please have fun, but be safe on your travels!

Please continue to pray for our outstanding staff, our federal, state, and local elected officials, our armed service members and first responders. Pray for our members who are experiencing grief, loss, and medical issues, as well. I haven't yet met a single person who couldn't use prayer of some kind! Let's cover our community with prayer through the summer.

Even with all of that incredible talent, our team is never complete! If you have a heart for music and want to join in the fun, there's room for you, too.



THE BOOK NOOK Claudia Moberly

With all that has been going on in the Catholic Church the last few weeks. I was curious to learn more about The Seeker Catholic thought and practice. One book on the UWF Reading List is The Seeker and the Monk: Everyday Conversations with Thomas Merton, by Sophfronia Scott. Scott is a Black reader. contemporary writer, thinker, contemplative the and "seeker" in the title. She is Episcopalian with "Baptist notes from [her] childhood," as she describes her faith. Merton was a white



Catholic monk, writer, theologian, mystic, poet, and social activist. He spent most of his life in a monastery in Kentucky and died in 1968. So how do these two people have "everyday conversations"?

Scott delves into Merton's personal journals to understand his thinking and explore the questions he asked in a wartorn and divided world; questions still relevant today. By juxtaposing her spiritual questions and thoughts with quotes from Merton's journals, Scott guides us, chapter by chapter, into deeper thinking about materialism, ambition, the healing gifts of nature, spiritual fatigue, service, prayer, race relations, loving the way God teaches us to love, and finally, facing death as a person of faith.

These two thinkers, of different faith traditions, life experiences, and generations find both commonality and divergence, yet hold true to the passion of seeking out God's love, guidance, and hope for our lives in a world that continues to fall short of what Jesus described and modeled.



Our gifts at work this month: a poultry livelihood project to empower women and young girls from Mutare District, Zimbabwe; expansion of the capacity of the Women Peace Dialogue Platform, a network of women peace activists in Southeastern Europe, including Ukrainians and Russians; support of the InterServ Food Pantry through Interfaith Community Services in St. Joseph, Missouri, providing weekly food orders for people who are going through financial crises.
