


# PASTOR MIKE'S MUSINGS

Dear Warm Heart Friends and Family:

A congregation recently gifted me a book about the Mayflower—the boat that transported the Pilgrims to the "New World" just over 400 years ago. I am learning a few new facts about those early Americans.

In elementary school, we drew the Pilgrims as wearing black clothing with buckles on their shoes and hats. Truth be told, they typically wore bright clothing—saving their black clothing for church or high holy days. Even then, their idea of black would have been different from ours, more likely a dark grey or even a blue. The deep black we are familiar with would have been expensive to produce, and thus not very *pious*. Shirts of bright blues, deep reds, and purples were common. Buckles were not even around in 1620—and the Pilgrims didn't like ornamentation anyway. I need to go back and update my second grade drawings!





The Pilgrims also intended to settle elsewhere! They planned to reach Virginia to reinforce the area around Jamestown, hoping to locate north of Jamestown—far enough away to be their own colony, but close enough for help should they need it. Of course, we know that they were off course when they landed in Massachusetts. Due to rough seas, dangerous currents, and shoals, they were unable to travel south, and instead took shelter in Cape Cod. Soon, they decided to stay, and they created the Mayflower Compact because their location was outside of English law and charter.

Of the 102 folks who sailed, and of the 52 that survived that first year, it is estimated that over 35 million Americans have a direct ancestor from the Mayflower—about 10 percent of us! Go forth and multiply indeed.

At this point, I'm sure you won't be surprised to hear that the original Thanksgiving looked a little different from the way it's often depicted and celebrated today. For one thing, it was three days long! For another, it's far more likely they ate deer and pheasant than turkey. The original feast occurred in 1621, and here's an interesting little detail: we have two primary accounts of the feast, and neither refers to it as a celebration of thanksgiving!

In this season of Thanksgiving, we want to take our first four Sundays of November and give thanks to a few of our Warm Heart folks at both services.

**November 2** – All Saints Remembrance: We will name and honor those in our congregation who have passed away since last year. Their friends and family are invited to attend as we light a candle for their loved one.

**November 9** – Veterans and Quilters: We will ask those who have served to stand and be recognized. We will also bless the quilts made by our quilters over the past season.

**November 16** – We will recognize those in our church family who have been a part of our church for 50-plus years. We have 15 members who have been here that long!

**November 23** – We will give thanks to our church staff and those who served in leadership positions within our church over this past year.

We also give thanks for YOU this November. Our church is what it is because of our faithful members who pray, serve, give, and attend. Thank you for being a wonderful church to serve!

#### **FINANCE**

When I was younger and playing sports, I was very superstitious. If we won, I would avoid washing my uniform, eat the same things eaten on the day of our victory, etc. My goal was to replicate everything I had done before. Did this help in future games? Probably not, but I didn't want to take the chance that I could jinx a victory. In that spirit, I am duplicating the exact same article I presented last year, since we are in an eerily similar position. Only the numbers will be changed. The rest is the same (but edited for length).

We have now completed one month in the last quarter of 2025. I wish I had good news to report, but we are still lagging behind in our effort to reach a breakeven point at the end of the month. Instead of attacking our current deficit, we are falling further behind. We were only behind \$6,484 in September, but our total deficit for the year is more than \$47,000. At this point in 2023, we were behind over \$60,000, and last year we lagged a little over \$70,000.

Alas, we must address the possibility of being in a negative position at the close of 2025. Of course, we have always been a church that rises to the occasion at the end of the year, but this trend means sleepless nights and stomach ulcers for those of us who deal with the church finances on a regular basis. Ideally, we hope to break even more months than not, so there's less of a deficit to tackle during the holiday season.

We have two full months of giving to erase this deficit. We have done it in the past, and I have every confidence that if any group can do this, it is the Church of the Warm Heart. This is a very busy yet important time for our church. Once again, we are faced with this deficit as we are in the process of setting the budget for 2026. In the next two months, our committees and staff will be making tough decision regarding the budget.

Back to the present! So how did we do? In the last quarter of 2024, we received gifts of more than \$300,000, which allowed us to finish the year in a positive position. Can we do it again in 2025? I hope so! It will take prayer, family discussion, and a willingness to reach our goal. I plan to do my part! FYI, I ate the same thing for breakfast today as I did yesterday, but Diane insisted I wash my underwear.

#### THE BOOK NOOK

Claudia Moberly

Hyeonseo Lee offers her personal insight into life under one of the world's most ruthless and secretive dictatorships. In her memoir, *The Girl With Seven Names: Escape from North Korea*, she details her escape from her homeland and the ensuing struggle to avoid capture and repatriation and to guide her family to freedom.



Her home on the border with China gave her some exposure to the world beyond the confines of the Hermit Kingdom, and a glimpse of economic gains based on black market sales. As famine struck in the 1990s, she began to wonder about things she had been told her entire life. Given the repression, poverty, and starvation she saw all around her, was her country really "the best on the planet"?

At age seventeen, Lee decided to escape North Korea by crossing the river into China. Young and naive, she did not imagine it would be twelve long and stressful years before she was reunited with her family, and could once again use her rightful name.


